This conference is dedicated to discussing issues confronting policy makers, community leaders and educators on current issues concerning human rights, social justice and equality of educational opportunities globally. It is aiming to offer strategic education policy analysis on recent shifts in human rights education both locally and globally. It will give suggestions for directions in human rights education and social justice policy changes, relevant to democratic and empowering Australian community in the 21st century.

There is no doubt in my mind that this international conference in terms of its objectives, program and dissemination will have a great impact on the current global dialogue surrounding human rights, intercultural dialogue and peace education—both nationally and globally. It is likely to contribute to a better understanding and knowledge of human rights education and social justice in Australia and the wider community.
